# Pastor's Message

# The Reason Why You're Not Where You Think You Should Be

Who we are is not necessarily who we are called to be. Often we are called to become, to be other than who we are, to be more than who we are, to be a part of something greater than who we are. And for most of us, that's usually a good idea.

The Bible is full of people who wanted to do one thing and who were called by God to do another. Jonah is a great example. He literally had to be thrown off the ship by God-fearing sailors before he obeyed God's command to go to Nineveh to tell the sinners there to repent. Many of the prophets frequently expressed their wishes to be doing something else if they could. But God called them, and they spoke.

Surprisingly for modern Americans, the Bible does not focus primarily on self-fulfillment as a goal of Christian living. Exhortations are made to live a Christian Life in the face of persecution and distress (1 Peter 4). Christian freedom, however, is worshipping God and serving others (Matthew 22:36-40; Galatians chapter 5). Paul uses strong language and says that a goal of human development should find us becoming a "slave of Christ" (1 Cor

7:22). This is strange and uncomfortable talk for Americans who exercise personal freedom perhaps more than any people on Earth.

Yet our opinions of ourselves often have little to do with who we are called to be in our lives. We all confront this challenge in our jobs, our family life and our relationships with our friends.

Did you ever wonder why you find yourself in a job you feel you don't belong in, living with people who constantly frustrate you and associate with friends who constantly challenge your ability to do the right thing?

The reason, in addition to sin which permeates the world, is that often our expectations of who we are, where we are supposed to work, who we are to live with and associate with, often these expectations are fantasies based not on the Biblical reality of God in history but on beliefs formed by our own desires set within the context of a society which claims that deluded egocentric fantasies are reality.

Jesus God turns the world on its head (the Magnificat Luke 1:46-55). Only when we repent (metanoia) which means "mind change," turn to God), can we recognize that what we thought was reality is often unrealistic or fantasy expectation. By the same token, faith in Christ, which many people mistakenly confuse for egocentric works righeousness or irrelevant sugar-coated philosophy, is rooted in the real world and has life changing power.

The reaon why we're not where we think we should be is not because everyone is against us, but is rather because our expectations of life and our place in it are based too often on unrealistic world views formed, not from Scripture, but from social and personal delusions.

There exists no Biblical mandate nor permission to glorify or fulfill ourselves. Our salvation and identity depend completely on our faith in Christ and in our service to others.



Most merciful God, we pray that your loving arms surround all those who are in harm's way. Keep them safe, grant them courage and hope. All these things we ask in the name of Jesus Christ, our Lord. Amen.

by Heart: Conversations with Martin Luther's Small Catechism

led by Seminarian Scott Brubaker

Like the Small Catechism itself, this course aims to create faith. It is for adults who have never encountered the Small Catechism, and it is for adults who studied and memorized it as adolescents or teens. It is for those who assume that the original document requires no further explication and that we should simply pick it up and start reading (or memorizing). It is also for those who find scripture to be an inaccessible forest of words, the Creed and Lord's Prayer to be rote exercise, the sacraments to be obscure rituals, and Martin Luther and his innovations to be largely irrelevant. For those who are about to be introduced to the Small Catechism, and for those who know it well already, we hope the Spirit will use this course to ignite—and reignite—in them the irrepressible spark that Luther's poetic and resonant words uniquely do still today. So, the purpose of this course is to create space, at least, for conversations with Luther's Small Catechism.

We will be using a combination of a student handbook and short, lively, animated videos to help participants quickly engage in the session's topic.

# ELCA commitment to confronting racism and anti-Semitism

CHICAGO (Sept. 4, 2017) – The Rev. Elizabeth A. Eaton, presiding bishop of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA), has issued the following statement in response to the Trump administration's announcement about the Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals (DACA) program.

"As we journey together through the time God has given us, may God give us the grace of a welcoming heart and an overflowing love for the new neighbors among us" –ELCA social message, "Immigration" (1997).

We are saddened today by the end of the Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals (DACA) program, which provided relief from deportation to young people who have grown up as members of our churches, as neighbors playing with our children, and enriching our communities. We pray today for those who will suffer undue repercussions due to the end of this program. As Lutherans, we regard the family as an indispensable social institution and stand firmly against policies that cause the separation of families.

As we lament this change in policy, we call on members of Congress to pass long-overdue legislation to protect young people brought to the U.S. as children, also known as Dreamers. Our churches, our schools, our communities and the country are enhanced by their presence and contributions. It is time that our immigration policy reflects their gifts to all of us.

For many Lutherans, food and faith are inextricably linked. We gather for a funeral—and a luncheon; a baptism—and reception; a wedding—and a banquet. And we gather around the table in worship to receive the meal that matters most of all, the Lord's Supper.

Sending manna from heaven, multiplying fish and loaves, Jesus as "the bread of life"—the Bible is rich with food imagery illustrating God's abundant love for us. It's no surprise, then, that making and sharing food is one way we express love for each other and our neighbors.

# Faithful Green Smoothie

Can drinking a kale smoothie be an act of faith? Indeed, it can. My morning glass of green goodness (my husband laughingly calls it "pond scum") helps me to acknowledge the environmental crisis God's earth faces.

In the U.S., animal feed crops use more than 10 times as many land acres as "people food crops" do (peta.org). I love knowing that I can conserve land

resources and thereby support people who are chronically undernourished when I drink this for breakfast.

In addition, my tasty smoothie has many personal benefits: flaxmeal for omega-3 essential fatty acids, turmeric for arthritis relief, almond milk for a bit of protein, kale for fiber, and micronutrients and chocolate for taste.

Pond scum? Bah, humbug! I lovingly raise my glass of green smoothie to God's people, to God's earth. Recipe (serves 1)

Making my smoothie is child's play: Pour a dash of this, add a scoop of that. No carob? No worries—add more cocoa. No bananas? Substitute strawberries. Don't have arthritis? Skip the turmeric.

Blend the following ingredients together until thick: 1 cup ice cubes

½ cup water

1/2 cup almond milk (I make my own by blending a handful of raw almonds, soaked; 1 teaspoon of vanilla; a pinch of salt and 4 cups of water. Strain if you wish.)

2 large kale leaves

1 large banana (the riper, the better)

1 tablespoon flaxmeal

1 teaspoon vanilla

1/4 teaspoon turmeric

1 tablespoon cocoa

1 tablespoon carob

Sugar or sweetener to taste (optional)

### **Removing Couch Upholstery Stains**

First, it's good to vacuum off cushions, or use a brush, every week, so dirt doesn't get ground in. When a spot happens, here are several green cleaners you can use (test in an inconspicuous place before getting to work):

For any type of stain, whipped detergent works well. Fill a container with half dish detergent, half water, and use a hand mixer to whip it up. Use a rag to rub the froth into the spot, and then rinse with water.

For coffee stains, Ecocycle recommends mixing an egg yolk with luke-warm water and rubbing that on the spot.


